

There was a wonderful display of fruit and vegetables again this year and many deserving prize winners.



We have learned there is an ongoing ePetition in connection with the above



closure of the right turn at the junction at the bottom of Seven Hills Road (B365) and Byfleet Road (A245) once the M25/J10 roadworks are completed.

The Highways scheme did not include this closure. It is understood that it was requested by Surrey CC without consultation or even advising local residents.

Drivers will be directed to turn left at the junction and proceed to the already busy A3 roundabout and then back along Byfleet Road towards West Byfleet.

It is felt that Surrey CC should reverse their decision and keep both right and left turns at the end of 7 Hills Road.

"QUEST" – A DIGITAL COLLAGE

For ten years, Claremont & Oxshott Arts Society have been supporting Young Arts at St Andrews Primary School in Cobham, Surrey. This year the project was for Year 6 pupils to make a digital collage mural to celebrate Africa and its amazing culture in relation to their current year studies on MAAFA and the Transatlantic Slave Trade.

The Artist in Residence was Julie Hoyle, a contemporary artist and print maker. She ran 2 workshops- the first based on textures, the second on patterned prints, inspired by the work of Yinka Shonibare, a British/Nigerian artist. Printed patterns, using stencils and gelatine plates, were cut up and digitalized to colour the figures in the mural, showing young people in work and play, surrounded by seaweed and little fish, as emblems of St Andrews.

The finished mural was unveiled on 26th June by the Mayor of Elmbridge and hangs in the school hall.

It was great to witness a large turnout of visitors to the green and to see that the rain didn't dampen spirits. On reflection, spirits remained high whatever the weather! The Epsom & Ewell Silver Band was extremely game, playing on despite the rolling thunder overhead. MAN AND MACHINE COME TOGETHER TO SAVE THE DAY!

So you may remember my National Service story, and in particular that it taught me about servomechanisms which resulted in some enormous machines being built. The company I joined on leaving the forces (the electronics division of EMI) had developed its own analogue computer.

Now, with luck for EMI, Cincinnati, the American Machine tool company, had just won a contract from the American Air Force for fifteen 100 foot long milling machines which would carve Bomber wings out of solid metal. The good fortune for our company was that, at this time, Cincinnati had no ability or expertise in the computer control of Machine Tools. How on earth they were awarded such a technical contract without such skills I am even today astounded.

But without much apparent apprehension it just sent its engineers around the world to look for such skills and again amazingly it found us, a company just learning to apply our analogue controls to operate Machine Tools. I was one of the few with servo skills, learned in the Army, and thus I was appointed the servomechanism designer for the project.

We only had a small version of the machine tool in England for us to apply our controls and test out the basic design. But there was much more to do than just that. An American engineer came over and worked with us for several months. His name was Herb Füldner, a very nice chap.

We got our machine working well and other engineers in our group worked on a much simpler drilling machine, but a message came through one day from Cincinnati, "Our 75th anniversary is looming; You must help our plan." They apparently planned a demo of 18 machines which would simulate the holes on a golf course and we were initially to supply two.

I was out there with my family, in Ohio to keep our two machines in good order. All seemed to be on schedule, but when the drilling machine was unpacked after shipping from England, there were a few components lying loose on the floor of its cabinet. We were able to solder them back on. To our relief, it seemed to work correctly. Next day I checked more carefully. There was a problem. It drilled its hole half an inch adrift. I took the circuit back to the house that night that we were renting and mulled it over; two extra components might work. Next day Eureka! It worked first time, and every time.

So after that hiatus, all was peaceful for a while. But it didn't last! The machine on which I had been a member of the design team was going to be used to represent a golf hole for which it first cut a metal cylinder, and then re-cut this cylinder to a smaller diameter by changing its radius by a tenth of an inch

using a relay. Or that was the plan, except that sometimes the relay stuck.

We talked and jointly got an idea. I would stand inside the big cabinet and operating the relay by hand if it stuck! So eventually came the time to leave Ohio and take my family back to UK. For some

reason I chose to take them home by boat: RMS Queen Mary!

We had great success with Cincinnati.

IN MEMORIAM

EDWARD SEXTON November 1942—July 2023



Edward Sexton, Master Tailor, created bespoke suits for Swinging London's rock stars, models and other celebrities, including Twiggy, Cilla Black, Mick Jagger and Bianca Perez-Mora, the Beatles and Elton John, and co-founded Nutters of Savile Row with fellow 'rebel tailor', Tommy Nutter.

Edward's relationship with Nutter began when they worked in Burlington Arcade. Both men were from working class backgrounds and nurtured a desire to break the long existing Savile Row resistance to change.

Nutter had a wide social circle that brought him into contact with some of London's most influential movers and shakers. Sexton had been honing his skills by working for private clients eager to wear something more daring than the traditionally tailored suit.

Dubbed the "wizard with the scissors", Edward incorporated his training as a creator of military and riding wear to produce suits with a dramatic new shape. The "Sexton Look" was tightlywaisted and accentuated on the shoulders, with a wide lapel that was highly unusual for the time. From the outset Nutters bucked convention by dressing women as well as men. Sexton preferred the curvaceous, figure-hugging look. Many musicians and artists became fans of the 'Sexton look' including Eric Clapton, Yoko Ono, David Hockney and Peter Sellers were among his clientele. Three of the four Beatles wore Sexton suits on the Abbey Road album cover. Stella McCartney served as his apprentice before bringing him in to help with her first collection for the Paris couture house Chloe. Edward became Managing Director of Nutters in 1976. He continued drawing inspiration from 1920's, 1930s and 1940s.

The fourth of six children growing up in East London, Edward would run errands for his uncle's tailor's shop at the age of 12. At the age of 14 he had a job with a small West End tailor. On leaving school he worked as a commis waiter at the Waldorf Hotel in Covent Garden, which introduced him to a different world. Aspiring to ascend the class ladder he amassed a suitable wardrobe and set his sights on Savile Row. "I figured if you are going to be a good jockey, you better have the best stables" he explained. He was successful in America and toured the States twice a year with the London Collective. He returned to Savile Row after an interval of 30 years on a mission to re-awaken the public's taste for sharp tailoring in the wake of Covid-19

Edward lived in West End for many years with his wife Joan. He will be remembered for his wonderful tailoring skills and sense of humour and will be greatly missed by all his family, colleagues, and friends.


